Challenge Partners Review

As you will know from previous years, we are part of the Challenge Partners Network of Excellence which is an organisation that connects hundreds of schools who all share the desire to work together to evaluate and support each other in collaborative peer review.

This week, for our fourth annual review, we welcomed three visitors to the school from the Challenge Partners network based in London and the South East. Collaborating with these visiting school leaders enables us to take a detailed look at what works well at our school and the best bit, it gives us feedback on what could help make us even better. We focused on the quality of teaching, curriculum in reading, computing, PE and history, as well as leadership at all levels, behaviour and special needs provision. The review team saw many strengths in these areas such as strong and consistent phonics delivery; engaging reading lessons; knowledgeable staff, including highly effective support staff. The children represented the school impeccably and shared their pride in their school, and we are proud of them too!

The leaders have learnt a great deal about their subjects and what we can continue to work on. Our top priorities are to continue to support our coordinators in their leadership of curriculum in computing and PE, and to ensure our reading for pleasure initiative bears fruit – children enjoying and being motivated to read is proven as crucial to future academic success. Focus on: Bullying

Learning to understand and manage conflict is an important part of growing up. Bullying is not simply a 'falling out' with friends. Research shows that experiencing bullying can have a significant impact on a child's life well into adulthood. To ensure we are able to prevent bullying, act quickly when it takes place and avoid misidentifying bullying, it is vital that we have a shared definition of bullying. At St Osmund's, we define bullying as 'the persistent use of deliberately hurtful behaviour which is intended to cause distress and which results in pain and distress to the victim. Bullying can be physical, verbal or psychological. It can happen face-to-face or online'.

Bullying behaviour can be:

Physical - pushing, poking, kicking, hitting, biting, pinching etc.

Verbal – name calling, sarcasm, spreading rumours, threats, teasing, belittling.

Emotional — isolating others, tormenting, hiding books, threatening gestures, ridicule, humiliation, intimidating, excluding, manipulation and coercion.

Sexual – unwanted physical contact, inappropriate touching, abusive comments, homophobic abuse, exposure to inappropriate films etc.

Online /cyber - posting on social media, sharing photos, sending nasty text messages, social exclusion.

Indirect - can include the exploitation of individuals.

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What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service, with around two billion users exchanging texts, photos, videos and documents, as well as making voice and video calls. Its end-to-end encryption means messages can only be viewed by the sender and any recipients; not even WhatsApp can read them. Updates to its privacy policy in 2021 (involving sharing data with parent company Facebook) caused millions to leave the app, but the new policy was widely misinterpreted — it only related to WhatsApp's business features, not to personal messages.

CREATE A SAFE PROFILE

Even though someone would need a child's phone number to add them as a contact, it's also worth altering a young person's profile settings to restrict who can see their photo and status. The options are 'everyone', 'my contacts' and 'nobody' – choosing one of the latter two ensures that your child's profile is better protected.

EXPLAIN ABOUT BLOCKING

If your child receives spam or offensive messages, calls or flies from a contact, they should block them using 'settings' in the chat. Communication from a blocked contact won't show up on their device and stays undelivered Blocking someone does not remove them from your child's contact list – so they also need to be deleted from the address book.

REPORT POTENTIAL SCAMS

Young people shouldn't engage with any message that looks suspicious or too good to be true. When your child receives a message from an unknown number for the first time, they ii be given the option to report it as spam. If the sender claims to be a friend or relative, call that person on their usual number to verify it really is them, or if it's someone trying to trick your child.

LEAVE A GROUP

If your child is in a group chat that is making them feel uncomfortable, or has been added to a group that they don't want to be part of, they can use WhatsApp's group settings to leave. If someone exits a group, the admin can add them back in once; if they leave a second time, it is permanent. 4 +

THINK ABOUT LOCATION

If your child needs to use the 'live location' function to show you or one of their friends where they are, advise them to share their location only for as long as they need to. WhatsApp gives a range of 'live location' options, and your child should manually stop sharing their position as soon as it is no longer needed.


